To mark this special occasion, the school has brought every child and adult a commemorative mug. I do hope the children enjoy using it and will treasure it for years to come.


Here is a collection of the activities that have taken place this week.

Road Safety Competition

Well done to the Road Safety Committee, who delivered two assemblies last week, to Foundation and KS1 and then KS2. They told the children all about staying safe whilst being out near the road.

The messages included:

- Wearing bright or fluorescent clothes to help traffic see us when we are crossing the road
- How to cross the road safely by using traffic lights or zebra crossings
- Encouraging the children to walk to school or ride their bike safely.

They also set each Key Stage a competition for them to complete over the next two weeks. Foundation stage and Key Stage 1 were each given a road safety colouring picture to colour in and Key Stage 2 were asked to create a road safety poster with all of the information given out in the assembly. Dear Parents/Carers,

Thank you once again for completing the parent survey. This is always a very important part of communication with our parents as it allows us to find out what you think, celebrate the successes of our provision for your children and identify areas in which we could improve further. We have analysed the responses of which we had a total of 158.

We were delighted to see that you were pleased with what the school offers. 99% of our children like school and parents took the time to tell us some of the reasons why the children liked the school.

100% of our parents believe the school encourages the children to have good attendance and be punctual, with 93% stating that the school makes sure their child is well behaved which is an improvement from last year. This is excellent and an area both yourselves and us have been working hard on this year, including reminding us of the merits of being on time for school. We will continue to find more ways of further enhancing this.

All other questions had a similarly positive feedback, with parents feeling that the school is approachable and responds quickly to any concerns that are raised.

We continue to work hard on ensuring our children have lots of different opportunities to take part in sports and are encouraged to have a healthy lifestyle. Through our active months, visits from Active Anita, two days of sports coach teaching, after school clubs as well as weekly PE sessions and our lunchtime initiative – happy lunchtimes – we have worked hard to address an area parents raised last year. I was pleased to see that 95% of parents think their child is encouraged to be healthy and take regular exercise, which is an increase from last year.

It is also pleasing to see that 94% of parents feel their children feel safe in school and if they are worried about anything, 92% of parents say that their children know who their child can speak to if they feel worried. Staff have worked hard this year to incorporate many different strategies within their classroom to support children's worries and anxieties. These have included the popular worry monsters or worry boxes and emotion 'check in' boards in classrooms.

Fulfilling every child's potential

Last year, parents in a couple of year groups wanted more trips and our staff responded well to plan school visits as part of the curriculum as we have traditionally done to give the children valuable experiences that they are entitled to. We have always had a very good range here at Launde as we believe that these enrichment opportunities are really important.

Despite this, some parents still feel that there could be further activities planned. As a staff, we will look at this ready for next year to look to increase our visit offer, whilst being mindful of the cost of living increase that makes these harder to afford for some.

It as also pleasing to see that you feel that the school supports you to help your child. Staff have worked hard this year to increase the number of events and workshops in school and this was recognised by parents with 97% of parents saying they agreed with the help on offer at school and 96% of parents saying that the school makes them aware of what your child will learn during the year.

Overall, as you can see it was a very positive response which we are pleased about. Any other individual comments have also been collated and fed back to staff and year groups or been responded to be senior leaders as every comment is valued. Staff have already approached some parents and more will take place over the next weeks. If you haven't had contact, and want to, do feel free to contact the school.

What Parents & Carers Need to Know about

Apple debuted the first iPad in 2010, kickstarting the tablet market, and it remains the best-selling tablet to this day. Although Apple doesn't offer a child-specific version, iPads are hugely popular with youngsters due to their ease of use and endless choice of apps. There's a selection of models, with different-sized screens and distinct features – including the standard iPad; the iPad Air; the iPad Pro; and the iPad mini. Thankfully, they all offer parental controls so you can regulate how your child uses the device ... and how long they spend on it.

PHYSICAL DAMAGE

WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

While some tablets (such as the Amazon Fire Kids editions) come with rugged shock-proof cases, iPads aren't built for rough and tumble. They're also more expensit than most other tablets, and any damage your child's iPad suffers could be costly to repair. Buying a child-friendly case and screen protector for the device could be a wise move, especially if it's being used by younger ones.

SCREEN ADDICTION

INAPPROPRIATE

Even if it would never occur to your child to go searching online for age-inappropriate sites, apps or information, there's always a possibility that something unexpected – perhaps a video that auto-plays or content incorrectly suggested by an algorithm – could appear on their tablet and upset them. You can help prevent this by adjusting the content settings (see our 'top tips' section below).

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The parental controls built into iOS (the fundamental operating system of Apple devices) enable you to block access to most age-inappropriate content – but your child could potentially still bypass these restrictions (either accidentally or deliberately) by using Siri, Apple's voice-activated digital assistant. To avoid this, toggle the 'Ask Siri' functions to 'off' in the iPad's settings menu.

Advice for Parents & Carers

ENABLE FAMILY SHARING

ተ**ተ**ቸት Before letting little ones loose on an irad, it's a good idea to set up Family Sharing, as this lets you utilise the parental controls to manage exactly how your child is able use the device. You can do this fairly easily by going into the irad's settings, once there, you'll be able to add an existing Apple account (if your child already has one) or set one up from scratch.

APPLY SOME LIMITS

The 'Downtime' function allows you to tell the iPad to lock itself at certain periods (at mealtimes or before bed, for instance), while 'App Limits' removes access to certain apps once they've been used for a specified length of time each day. The iPad can display a reminder when these limits have nearly been reached, letting your child mentally prepare for the end of their gaming or viewing time.

STOP ACCIDENTAL SPENDING

To empower your child with an increased sense of freedom on their device (without giving yourself something else to worry about in the process) you could enable the iPad's 'Ask to Buy' feature. Whenever your child tries to download or buy an app, game or product, the iPad sends you a request to approve (or deny!) it. This option only becomes available if you've set up Family Sharing.

SET CONTENT AND PRIVACY RESTRICTIONS

The parental controls can stop the iPad from displaying explicit or age-inappropriate content (in apps like iTunes and Salari, for instance) when your child is signed into their account. You'll also be able to restrict the capacity to download and install apps, and you can specify permissions which prevent children from changing the iPad's privacy settings once you've selected them.

TRACK IT DOWN

Just like the iPhone, Apple's iPads have 'Find My' software to help you locate your child's iPad — or indeed, any linked Apple devices that have gone AWOL, including phones, watches and AirPods. If you enable 'Find My' in the settings menu, it will display the last known location of an iPad that's been mislaid, as well as giving you the option to lock a missing iPad that you suspect has been stolen.
