







Here is Marnia from Bosworth, Y2, making 'Bubble and Squeak' with ingredients from her ration book!

#### What is VE Day?

#### VE Day Celebrations 1945

In 1945 the German army was getting weaker and nearly defeated. On Tuesday the 8th May the war had stopped and many people were celebrating. They marked this day with lots of fun, street parties and bonfires. Huge crowds of people gathered outside Buckhingam Palace dressed in red, white and blue. They all cheered as King George VI and his family came out to greet everyone on the balcony.

# **Britain Blackout**

### Why did this happen?

In 1939 on the 1<sup>st</sup> of September which was two days before the war, Britain completely blacked out. It was chaos, no see though curtains or car headlights. Even the slightest glimpse of light was banned such as the glow from a cigarette and lighters! Because Germany could potentially see the light when they were in their planes, that is why the blackout happened in the first place. It may have been a good idea, but it caused many casualties. People in cars had to be very careful of their surroundings as there were people about on the roads in the complete darkness. Due to this serious problem,



people started painting white stripes on the road which we still use to this day. They also painted white on curbs so that they knew where the roads were. It was so serious that lots of households were just waiting for a knock on their door to be told they had a bit of light in view.

By the new year, the authorities eased the light restrictions and the only lights that were allowed were tiny little pocket lights which used No. 8 batteries which were quite rare, so people continued to roam around in the dark dangerously.

Why should you follow these rules? It was essential to follow these rules because if you didn't, you would've been in danger as planes from Germany were flying over, so it was important to follow these rules

As you can see from the newsletter, there are lots of examples of good deeds, resilience and determination shown by our pupils, some super talents and skills that will shape our learners in a positive way for the future.
